## "Year of the Writer" Launched with Edison International Grant

Everyone has a story to share, but for many, writing is a challenge. To help adult learners reach their literacy goals, the Friends of A.K. Smiley Public Library applied for and received a \$5,000 grant from Edison International. The grant is funding two writing workshops to train adult learners and their tutors in new writing strategies, and updates to the computer class curriculum to include a new writing module.

Using their new writing skills, learners are encouraged to write their personal stories. The Redlands Adult Literacy Program will publish an anthology of the learners' works and share these works with the community. ### Adult Learner Leadership Institute (ALLI) transforms learners into leaders

The Adult Learner Leadership Institute (ALLI), funded by the California State Library, is a statewide training program that provides adult learners the opportunity to gain public speaking, networking, advocacy, communication, and leadership skills. We are pleased that the Redlands Adult Literacy Program was chosen to host the southern California ALLI conference. Diane Shimota, adult literacy coordinator, has witnessed the benefits of ALLI. She shared her pride in four ALLI graduates, who are adult learners in the Redlands Adult Literacy Program and will serve as facilitators at this year's ALLI conference.

Ana Alcantar has been an annual ALLI facilitator since 2015. Ana says that stepping into the role of facilitator provided her the opportunity to apply everything she had learned, to challenge herself, and to give back something in return. The Redlands Adult Literacy Program and ALLI have helped Ana with her business and given her skills that she uses as an advocate for adult literacy in the community. Ana wants everyone to have the same opportunities that are available to her.

**Crystal Moreno** says that ALLI helped her to gain skills that enabled her to speak in public, speak with her college professors, and become president of a club at her college. Crystal looks forward to the opportunity to teach other adult learners the skills they need to become leaders in their communities.

**Martha Romo** shared that the ALLI program gave her the confidence and skills that she needs to speak in front of people. She learned how to organize her ideas and to use tools like PowerPoint to prepare more effective presentations at her job. Martha looks forward to introducing other learners to skills that help them set goals.

**Lucila Campa** will lead networking and advocacy sessions at the ALLI workshop. These skills are important to her because they have helped her grow as a person, a mother, and a community member. Lucila uses her public speaking skills when she speaks at quarterly tutor training meetings. She is looking forward to giving back a little of what she has received by teaching leadership skills to others.

Graduates of the ALLI workshop become advocates for adult literacy and other causes that are important to them. ALLI Project Coordinator, Rosie Manela, has witnessed how ALLI graduates gain confidence. She sees them "coming out of their shells, expressing their ideas, and speaking in front of a group." The Redlands Adult Literacy Program will send five new adult learners to this year's ALLI conference. Their new-found leadership skills will help the adult literacy program and the Redlands community.
