

History of the Friends of the A.K. Smiley Public Library Redlands, California

PURPOSE

The purpose of the Friends of A. K. Smiley Public Library shall be: to assist the Trustees and the library staff in communicating to the community information about the resources, services, programs, and special events of the library; to augment the financial resources of the library with funds raised by the Friends; and to aid in the planning and sponsorship of library programs.

FORWARD

In reviewing 25 years of newspaper clippings about the Friends of A.K. Smiley Public Library, "extraordinary" is the only word appropriate to describe my feelings.

Those original charter members were all community leaders and veterans of a variety of organizational participation. Their experience and enthusiasm lent spirit and results in forming the Friends organization.

You only have to look at the contents of this service booklet in order to appreciate the labor and fruitful benefits in behalf of the Smiley. The Friends gifts range from capital improvements and research equipment, to art and rare manuscripts. They have helped to underwrite legendary fund-raising galas and have contributed to the Library and Lincoln Memorial Shrine endowments.

A host of volunteers staffs the Friends Bookstore and the innovative silent auction table of rarities has become the talk of collectors and an often polite but tense contest of wills and wallets.

In the 26 years that I have worked at the Smiley, I have received only "good and kind" from the Friends. They have supplemented our collections, benefitted staff morale, made special selections and research available to the patrons, and ask for nothing in return.

Blest by their energy and emboldened by their dedication, Smiley Library is better - far better - because of the Friends of the Library. If the first 25 years are prologue, I can only imagine what the millennium and years beyond will produce.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE FOR THE SILVER JUBILEE

The month of June 1998 marks the 25th anniversary of the founding of the Friends of the A. K. Smiley Public Library. During the intervening years hundreds of volunteers have given tens of thousands of hours and raised hundreds of thousands of dollars to assist the Trustees and the library staff by providing the community with information about the Library and the bookstore operated by the Friends.

In 1973 the Friends elected Patty Serrano as the first president followed by Dr. William J. Moore. That first year ended with a balance of \$631 in the treasury. During that year the Friends sponsored a magic show for children. Membership has grown from 100 to more than 500. In 1975 the first book sales of 6,000 and 10,000 books netted a total of \$3,300.

Events and programs sponsored by the Friends for members and the public have been a service to the community. The financial support of the bookstore by members and library patrons has helped the Library to provide some services which might not have been possible otherwise. The members and patrons can be proud of the results of the first twenty five years.

The Friends are deeply grateful to generous donors of money and books which, via auctions and sales, allow us to help the Library.




As the nominee for incoming president of the Friends of the A. K. Smiley Public Library, I have been asked to write a few of my thoughts.

\$225 was donated to the library for art prints to be circulated.

The March open meeting speaker was Dr. Ray Billington whose topic, "Why We Can No Longer Behave Like Americans", dealt with wasting natural resources.

The first book sale was held April 4 for members only and April 5 for the general public, with 6,000 books on sale. The sale cleared more than \$1,500.

The Friends donated \$87.28 for a flagpole. Flags were donated by Congresswoman Shirley Pettis and a W.W.I widow.

Saturday, October 4, was the date of the second book sale. 10,000 books were offered, and the sale netted \$1,801.86

In January, \$179.00 was donated for a cabinet to store historical Citrograph files.

The Friends' first "Supper in the Stacks" was held May 1, with 170 persons attending. Dr. William J. Moore presented a slide show, "Early-Day Redlands."

The Friends supported the bond drive for new wings to the library as well as architect's fees.

A book sale was held October 2, with 4,000 books offered in the Lyon wing and 16,000 books offered outdoors. City Boy Scout troops helped with the sale, and \$2,556.20 was cleared.

Speaker at the January general meeting was Patricia Veryan. A small silent auction was held which netted \$254.

The Friends indicated their support for the library's "wish list" of priority projects including: furniture for the Scott Lounge, VCR recorders and monitors, a video of both the library and the Lincoln Shrine, and book-binding equipment.

The spring book sale was held April 5 and netted \$4,437.11.

Program for the annual meeting May 18 was a reception honoring Phyllis Irshay, retiring Library Director, and Larry Burgess, Interim Director.

The friends made a donation of \$500 toward restoration of the Los Angeles Central Library, which had been badly damaged by fire.

Friends' president William O. Ahlborn joined James A. Celebrating a 25-year 'Friendship'

 The Friends of A.K. Smiley Library are getting ready to celebrate their 25th anniversary of raising funds to benefit the library.

REDLANDS — The Friends of A.K. Smiley Public Library will be celebrating their 25th anniversary Sunday, June 28, when they meet in the Library Assembly Room.

Marbeth Munn, secretary of the Friends of the Library board and a student of England and its royalty, will present the program on "The Queens of England." This is the third in a trio of programs on England this spring, including two by vice president and former president Fritz Bromberger on the monarchs and later on the art and architecture of England.

The social time is 3:30 p.m., with lecture at 4. James Fallows will be installed as president of the Friends, with Bromberger continuing as vice president, Munn as secretary and Barbara Morse

Others on the board include Orville and Loretta Hansa, bookstore chairmen; Jean Fallows, Library Board representative; Richard Wilkerson, Jack Andriese, Boyd Nies, Mary Leonard, Vicki Fountain, Geni Banda and Eugene Ouellette.

The Friends are already scheduling events for the fall season. On Saturday, Oct. 3, the Friends will host a reception and sponsor the "Books Interpreted by Art and Literature" show of the San Bernardino Valley Branch of the National League of American Pen Women, which will be on exhibit in the Smiley library Assembly Room. The exhibit, featuring artworks by NLAPW members, will be accompanied by related poetry of other members.

On Sunday, Nov. 23, Virginia Westervelt of Redlands will speak on "That Incredible Woman, Eleanor Roosevelt," the subject of her latest biography. In 1981 she had spoken on her book "The Pearl Buck Nobody Knows."

The Friends of the Library raise several thousand dollars a year through many volunteers hours given in their bookstore on the lower level of the library. The store is open daily 10 a.m.-4 p.m., and to 6 p.m. on Tuesday and Thursday nights.

Outgoing president Albert Clark emphasizes the continual need for books to be sorted and sold. "If anybody wants to donate, just drop them in the trunk in the lobby, or phone the library or me or the board. We sometimes pick them up by the

truckload. We get some marvelous books and some junk, but we never throw a book away. Even if it's not worth selling, if it's an old text or the back is broken or water damaged or pages torn, we put it out on the free tables and never have

crouble getting rid of them."

Clark spoke of the popularity of the past two years of weekly silent auctions of higher-value books which have been donated. A dozen each week are prominently placed on a table by the main entrance for browsers to consider and overbid one another throughout the week, with the bidding closing on each set of book on Thursday at 1 p.m. The high bidders are then notified and come to the bookstore to pick up their "treasure."

Barbara Morse, as chairman of volunteers, is seeking new workers for the bookstore. She can be contacted at 335-7209.

Library director Larry Burgess, in his foreword to the "History of the Friends of A.K. Smiley Public Library," recently compiled for the group's silver anniversary, said that in reviewing 25 years of newspaper clippings, "extraordinary" is the only word appropriate to describe his feelings.

"You have only to look at the contents of this service booklet in order to appreciate the labor and fruitful benefits in behalf of the Smiley," he said. "The Friends' gifts range from capital improvements and research equipment, to art and rare manuscripts. They have helped to underwrite legendary fund-raising galas and have contributed to the library and Lincoln Memorial Shrine endowments.

Clark notes that during the years, hundreds of volunteers have given tens of thousands of hours and raised hundreds of thousands of dollars to assist the trustees and the library staff.

In 1973, the Friends elected Patty Serrano as the first president, followed by William J. Moore, president of Crafton Hills College. That first year ended with a balance of \$631 in the treasury. Membership has grown from 100 to more than

500.

Also serving on that first board in 1973 were D. Eston Field, Barbara Abele, Ellen Schaunaman, Larry Myers, Olive Wheeler, Richard Wilkerson, Esther Mertins, Jo Juran, Barbara Wormser and Edward Taylor.

The letterhead (still in use in 1998) was designed by John Melcher.

Joining the board in 1974 were the Rev. John D. Foerster and Cynthia Sims. That year, the Friends sponsored their first speaker, lexicographer William E. Umbach on "Our Stone-age Vocabulary."

By 1976, the Friends were supporting the bond drive for new wings to the library, and Ralph Hone spoke on "Dorothy L. Sayers" and her mark on English literature.

Over the years, featured speakers included many authors; book, autograph and bookplate collectors; television personalities and newspaper columnists. Included in 1977 was Redlands school superintendent Thomas Boysen on "Does the Written Word Have a Future?"

In 1984 the Friends purchased 16 Leo Politi paintings for the library.

During these early years, the book sales were accomplished by hauling thousands of donated, stored books out of the old library basement, with the help of Boy Scouts. Tables were set up throughout the grassy area between the library and the Lincoln Shrine (before the recent expansions of either). During the two years of the library expansion, the books were stored in the lower level of First Presbyterian Church, and the sale was held in the closed-off Vine Street between the church and Old City Hall. Now shopping is climate-controlled, dust-free and well-lighted in the Friends' bookstore.

Membership in the Friends of the Library is \$10; \$5 for seniors and students; \$15 for family; \$25 for patrons. Memberships are available in the Friends of the Library bookstore, and members are granted half off the price of books sold there. To donate large quantities of books requiring pickup, phone the library at 798-7565.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The 2014 - 2015 fiscal year has been one of progress, recognition and growth for The FOL:

Progress: We have launched our on-line sales of books via E- Bay and Half.Com and we have boosted our weekly auction sales revenue significantly. We have recognized that the FOL is, indeed, a business operation and have created a departmental structure which makes both operational and budget planning more efficient. Each of the Department Managers now has a budget which reflects Operational plans for the fiscal year - and each manager controls his/her budget. We have started the Tom Taylor Children's Book Fund (based on continuing monthly contributions of former Redlander Tom Taylor) Mr. Taylor is seeking additional funds from others and wants the fund to be a long-term part of the FOL operations. Purpose of the fund is to distribute books to children from disadvantaged homes and to bring those homes into regular contact with the library and its programs.

The most dramatic progress this year has been the renovation of the bookstore. The murals by Stephanie Parsons at the entrance to the store make the store more inviting. Interior artwork by Sally Bell, a former Disney artist help to make the store a more pleasant place to be. Some more interior painting is planned for the coming year. The Marketing Department spear-headed the bookstore renovation as part of a larger program to boost over-all store sales.

Recognition: Our Marketing Department put on a significant membership event last October -- The Round-up -- which featured local authors. This event won an award from the United For Libraries Division of the American Library Association On May 13 Rita Reading and Kate Pretorius were invited to give a presentation based on our award-winning event to the annual convention of the ALA / United For Libraries.

Growth: Our FOL membership has grown to just under 1100 this past year. The Marketing Committee plans to make 2015 - 2016 a MEMBERSHIP YEAR and boost Membership to a new high both in terms of numbers and in terms of Dues Receipts. Dues receipts make a significant part of our FOL revenue, and growth of this revenue Is important to our ability to continue our high level of financial support for the AKS.

The most significant changes in FOL programs of this past year have taken place in the ADULT LITERACY PROGRAM which is operated as a Department of the Friends of the Library. With the support of the library leadership and of the City Council, the library has added a part-time Coordinator to staff. This means that (a) the library administration and the Council have accepted that the Literacy Program should be part of the regular library activities, and (b) the Coordinator will take over much of the administrative work of the Literacy Program freeing Trudy W. And Katherine G. to supervise and train tutors and seek outside funding for expansion. At present the Literacy Program has more than 90 PAIRS of tutors and learners, with more waiting in the wings. The FOL Adult Literacy Program has grown to be one of the largest and effective in the State of California. Recognition of this has come in the form of support for the program taken into the AKS library budget as well the FOL budget. The Literacy Program is expected to continue to grow in the year to come.

Expansion of Auction activities and on-line sales activities has created a need for additional volunteer help. We will be seeking to recruit and train volunteers to assist In these efforts.

We are looking to create new opportunities for FOL Members to "connect" with FOL and the Library. Ideas under discussion include author receptions, special receptions, Lectures, joint activities with the AKS. We are hoping to redefine membership in the FOL and to make membership more rewarding and meaningful.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The 2015 - 2016 fiscal year has been one of consolidation and innovation for the Friends of the Library. Membership numbers have vacillated between 1000 and 1100 through the year. Due to restructuring of the membership fees, however, dues revenue has actually increased. We have several members who have joined with dues of \$500 and \$1000, and we have many more who have joined at the \$100 level. Bookstore revenue has remained at the same level as in prior years, but auction revenues have increased. Weekly auction revenue averages more than \$700, with some weeks reaching \$900 or \$1000. The number of active volunteers who man the store, special sales and auction remains about the same as in prior years, with new volunteers coming aboard as others leave.

The organization of the Friends into a departmental structure has worked very well. Each of the departments (Bookstore, Auction, Membership, Volunteer Affairs, Marketing/Publicity, Financial Affairs and Adult Literacy) is headed by a Manager who prepares the budget for the department, plans departmental operations, and supervises the volunteers who work in the department. This operational structure has enhanced cooperation and overall planning for the affairs of the Friends.

The Bookstore Manager is Ellen Schollenberger. Ellen has instituted monthly meetings of all bookstore volunteers for the purpose of sharing Information, training, problem solving and creating a sense of "esprit" among members. The result has been more efficient operations, better coordination, and enhanced camaraderie.

The Auction Department is headed by Ted Parsons. The Auction Team has about 14 members who work mainly on Mondays and Tuesdays, though several work other days as well. New to the team are Gregg Breed, who manages the E-Bay sales of our more valuable books; Sue Remes

and Kay Dobbertin who handle the Half.Com on line sales. The Tuesday team which sees to the regular weekly auction is supervised by Dave Bragg. Behind the scenes are Wally Cook and Bob Birnbaum who process the incoming books and select those with auction potential.

Membership Department is led by Kate Pretorius who has put into place a whole new manner of handling membership records, and member contact. Under Kate, all members are contacted by letter regarding member status, renewal, and other special topics. Since Kate has taken over, membership revenue has increased due to higher level renewals.

Marketing/Publicity this year has been managed jointly by Laurie Aldern and Rita Reading. Under their leadership, the FOL mounted an enormously successful Holiday event featuring Santa Claus. Over 200 families came to see Santa this year. Each child who sat on Santa's lap received a gift wrapped book and a candy. The associated Holiday Book Sale earned about \$2400. This event was so successful that plans are already underway to repeat, and improve, it in FY 2016. Marketing has also been responsible for the weekly news articles about the auction, intermittent articles about other FOL events, street signs and contacts with local businesses.

Volunteer Affairs have been managed by Alice Moore. Alice oversees the staffing roster for the bookstore, special sales and other events put on by the Friends. Just this month Alice, together with Ellen S., organized a volunteer appreciation luncheon. A new aim is to to more to make volunteer participation "fun" while building a renewed sense of commitment to the FOL team.

The Financial Affairs Department consists of our able and hard-working Treasurer, Robert Garcia, and our Assistant Treasurer, Mike Henry. Mike receives, records and banks all incoming money for all departments; Bob Garcia handles all disbursements, manages our accounts and keeps track of all budgetary matters. Because these men our accounting meets high standards and makes us eligible for grant funding.

The Adult Literacy Program is a department of the Friends. Managers of this Department and Trudy Waldron and Katherine Gifford. Trudy and Katherine work closely with Diane Shimota the Adult Literacy Coordiantor recently hired by the Library, indeed Trudy and Katherine worked to obtain the \$52,000 State Grant which funds most of the cost of the Coordinator Position. They also have obtained additional grant funding for Adult Literacy, and have organized the local fund-raisers, The Valentine Campaign and the Theatre Party, which have raised thousands of dollars. They have created an Advisory Committee to assist in local fund raising and program development planning.

During the current fiscal year the Tom Taylor Children.s Book Fund, has distributed books to children through the Family Services Agency, the Redlands Community Center and Clement Middle School. This fund was created by Tom Taylor with the idea that high quality children's books could be purchased from the Friends Stock and then distributed to children whose family circumstance precluded book purchases. The idea is to support the library, through purchasing books from the Friends, and to support the children by giving them books. Mr Taylor contributes to the fund each month and also raises money through soliciting from others.

A major event this year has been the creation of a partnership between the Friends and the Redlands Community Center. Last July the Friends Board of Directors voted to pay for the installation of bookshelves at the Center and to fill them with books for children and young adults. The idea was to use excess stock from the Friends Bookstore and make the books available to children and youth who do not normally come to the central library. In addition, the FOL has restocked the shelves of the Community Center Adult Lending Library using overstock books from our bookstore, The Center has long had its own lending library but the books were old and had low circulation. FOL volunteers visit the Center at least once monthly and restock the book shelves there. In addition, the FOL has organized thrice monthly story-times for children at the Center, On the 1st and 3rd Mondays of the month the story-times are in English, on the 2nd Monday the activity is in Spanish. These events are held coincidentally with the local school year calendar.

Looking back over the fiscal year, we can say that the FOL has maintained a very high level of activity. The Friends are doing more than they have ever done - more sales, more events, more members, etc. The challenge for the new fiscal year will be to maintain the level of activity, increase membership, and increase revenue needed to support the library in the face of continued city budget restrictions. This will be possible only with continued community support in the form of book donations, membership growth and volunteer commitment.

- *Revisited strategic planning, developed new five-year plan.

- *Through the efforts of numerous volunteers, the Friends continued its highly profitable Silent Auction operation, its Bookstore, and many pop-up and special book sales, to raise funds to support the library's collection and programming.

Silent Auction

It is my pleasure to announce that the Friends have had another successful year of raising funds for the library. Our fundraising efforts continue to be led by our team of volunteers that coordinate the incredibly popular weekly silent auction. Hours and hours of effort are spent in sorting, researching, preparing items for sale, bundling, monitoring and tracking of sales transactions. Our team scours donations for items of popular interest, and our practiced eyes regularly will feature items on film history, military history, gardening, classics, art, biographies, cooking, etc. Over \$34,000 has been raised this year to date!

Bookstore/Special Sales

A close second in our fundraising can be attributed to the efforts of our volunteers who maintain and staff the Bookstore on a weekly basis. We underwent a remodel of the Bookstore some years ago, and to this day, receive many positive comments on the attractiveness of the store, as well as how well it is organized. Our first Saturday of the Month Bag Sales continue to be a hit in the community, as attendees can fill bags with books for as little as \$5 – quite the deal! We also hold many "special sales" throughout the year – Lincoln & Civil War History; Art in the Park; Holiday; Semi-Annual; and Blowout \$1 Bag sales, to name a few. Between the Bookstore and Special Sales, over \$30,000 has been raised this year to date!

Library Use of Funds

How does the library use these funds? Books for adults, books for children and young adults, electronic resources, audio books, and DVDs are purchased. In addition, 26 programs were funded with support from the Friends – 18 children's programs (puppets, music, dancing); and 8 adult programs (travel, music, employment).

Adult Literacy

104 tutors have volunteered to tutor **105 adult learners**. Tutor/learner teams meet at the library or at one of three off site locations (the Redlands Community Center, Clement Middle School, and Family Services Association). 40 learners and 3 tutors contributed writing to Our Stories, A Collection of Writings, Volume 2. We will celebrate our authors on June 15th at a Celebration of Authors at the Contemporary Club at 2pm. The Adult Literacy Computer Lab has been refurbished thanks to a generous grant from The Contemporary Club. Our wonderful instructor, Kim Green, taught a series of beginning and intermediate computer classes this year along with a several individual computer workshops that provided in-depth learning for iPads, *PowerPoint*, *Word*, and smart phones!

Volunteer Efforts

How do we make this all happen? It is all due to the efforts of a dedicated core of volunteers. Here is how our activity breaks down for June 2018 – June 2019:

Silent Auction

The Friends have had another successful year of raising funds for the library. Our fundraising efforts continue to be led by our team of volunteers that coordinate the incredibly popular weekly silent auction. Hours and hours of effort are spent in sorting, researching, preparing items for sale, bundling, monitoring and tracking of sales transactions. Our team scours donations for items of popular interest, and our practiced eyes regularly will feature items on film history, military history, gardening, classics, art, biographies, cooking, etc. \$37,000 has been raised this year!

Bookstore/Special Sales

A close second in our fundraising can be attributed to the efforts of our volunteers who maintain, restock, and staff the Bookstore on a weekly basis. Our first Saturday of the Month Bag Sales continued to be popular in the community, as attendees can fill bags with books for as little as \$5. We also hold many "special sales" throughout the year – Lincoln & Civil War History; Holiday; Semi-Annual; and Blowout \$1 Bag sales, to name a few. Between the Bookstore and Special Sales, \$34,000 has been raised this year!

Adult Literacy

100+ tutors have volunteered to tutor **100+ adult learners**. Tutor/learner teams meet at the library or at one of three off site locations (the Redlands Community Center, Clement Middle School, and Family Services Association). We noted, with pride, that the adult literacy program was mentioned time and again in public letters of support to the City Council during discussions concerning the city budget. Adult literacy continues to be active despite the library closure, as tutor/learner teams meet via "Zoom."

Outreach & Community Support

This past year, the Friends partnered with a number of local businesses. Jersey Mike's and Corner Bakery worked with us in successful fundraising efforts last Fall. The following businesses generously donated gift cards that were used as prizes in our Annual Academy Awards Contest: The Breakfast Shack, Martha Green's Eating Room, Saverino's Italian Deli, and The State. The Friends also receive donations from the community throughout the year. We thank everyone for their generous support. A highlight in the Fall was our collaborative effort with the library for the *Dia de los Muertos* (Day of the Dead) event, which featured altars sponsored by families in honor of loved ones, Folklorico dancers, food truck serving delicious Mexican food, and fun family activities.
